

It's Easier to Keep Current Employees Than to Hire New Ones

According to the <u>Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS)</u> 3.5 million people voluntarily left their jobs in October (not including retires). That's about 2.3% of the workforce. In a <u>recent article</u> by Roy Maurer published on the Society for Human Resource Management website he notes Millennials account for just over half (51%) and manufacturing had the third highest turnover rate (20%) among industries named.

There are a number of reasons why employees are leaving, including:

- Higher salary and better perks
- Unmet needs and expectations
- Lack of career growth
- Opportunity for promotion
- Change in career

There are currently more job openings than people to fill them. And, people are looking for what is best for them. According to Work Institute approximately 40% are leaving within a year of being hired. Recruiting for an open position will cost you more than offering a desired "perk" to current employees.
